- a. The Lord will tell the leaders of Israel nothing, how dare they ask. Ezekiel 20:1-3
- b. The Lord told them to get rid of their idols, but they did not get rid of their idols. Ezekiel 20:4-8
- c. The Israelites rebelled in the wilderness, not keeping God's decrees or sabbaths. Ezekiel 20:9-26
- d. The Lord rules over Israel with an iron fist in great anger. He will bring them home. Ezekiel 20:27-44
- e. The Lord will set the brushland of Negev on fire. They say Ezekiel talks in riddles. Ezekiel 20:45-49

- d. God handed over Samaria (Oholah) to her Assyrian lovers to be killed. Ezekiel 23:5-10
- e. God handed over Jerusalem (Oholibah) to the Babylonians to abuse her. Ezekiel 23:11-35
