#### August 4

- b. Pharaoh Neco changed the name of Josiah's son Eliakim to King Jehoiakim for 11 years. 2 Kings 23:34
- c. Message for Judah's kings from the Lord: "Be fair-minded and just, do what's right." Jeremiah 22:1-5
- d. The Lord's message to Jeremiah about the palace: "The Lord will destroy this great city." Jeremiah 22:6-9
- e. The Lord says Jehoahaz will never return, he will die in captivity (he did in Egypt). Jeremiah 22:10-12
- f. Jeremiah gave an announcement to listen and turn from their ways or be destroyed. Jeremiah 26:1-8
- g. They threaten to kill Jeremiah. He told them that would be killing an innocent man. Jeremiah 26:9-15
- h. Jeremiah escapes death by officials who say he does not deserve the death sentence. Jeremiah 26:16
